READING CLIMATE FESTIVAL 2022

The third Reading Climate Festival will run from Saturday 24th September to Sunday 2nd October, concurrently with the UK-wide Great Big Green Week. Its aim is to inspire and encourage positive action on climate change, supporting Reading's commitment to being a Net Zero, climate resilient town by 2030.

The festival originated in 2020 as a series of online talks about various aspects of climate change and sustainable living to support the launch of Reading's Climate Emergency response.

New content this year includes a dedicated **Youth Fair** hosted by Reading School on Saturday 24th September; **Fun Palaces** hosted by Reading Libraries on Saturday 1st of October; it also incorporates **Reading Cycle Festival** on Sunday 25th September and **Reading RESCUE** (Reading Environmental Spaces Clean-Up Event).

When the ice starts to melt, the Polar Bear sets out on a guest across the ocean, up rivers, over land and back to the sea, picking up new and displaced friends along the way. Exploring why and how each creature lost its habitat, this classic picture book is a useful resource to introduce children to the importance of conservation. Beautifully realised with an eye-catching use of perspective, bold images and clever typography, The Journey Home is a wonderful picture book for both KS1 and KS2 children. The story is ideal to provoke ideas for creative writing and environmental topic work and this anniversary edition features project ideas that will be useful for home learning.

Written as a series of letters between a young girl and Greenpeace, the worldwide environmental organisation, this picture book explores why a whale cannot be expected to live long term in a pond. THIS MONTH'S TOP TIPS FOR SUSTAINABLE SCHOOLS

Have you thought about planting a hedge?

edges are an excellent boundary feature, particularly alongside roads where they adsorb some of the air pollution from vehicles. They can be beautifully manicured with pruned top and sides or an informal type comprising a series of tall shrubs giving a rounded effect. All provide shelter for birds in the winter months, and some offer food and breeding sites for insects, birds and small mammals.

The local conservation volunteers have offered to plant two school hedges a year, or it can be a PTA project. RCAN will probably be able to supply most of the hedging materials free of charge. However, it will need ongoing maintenance and that is the key issue for the choice of species and heights.
